



They were initially granted temporary visas, which means the recipient is not allowed to work or have access to education and healthcare benefits in Australia. 

Peter Broelman Shore Thing The Canberra Times, 19 February 2024 In February more than 40 male asylum seekers, who had arrived by boat, were flown to Nauru after being found in Beagle Bay, a tiny Indigenous settlement in a remote part of Western Australia. Opposition Leader Peter Dutton accused the government of having lost control of Australia's borders: 'I do not know whether the same level of surveillance is being undertaken as was the case when we were in government'.



Harry Bruce Another Change of Direction The Cairns Post, 31 May 2024

Direction 99 was a directive from Immigration Minister Andrew Giles that asked courts and tribunals to consider someone's ties to Australia as a primary consideration when reviewing their visa. The directive was initially a response to the New Zealand Government's attempts to end the deportation of New Zealanders who had spent most of their lives in Australia. It made news when several foreign nationals convicted of serious crimes were allowed to remain in the country, prompting Giles to draft a new directive intended to make community safety the primary consideration in future decisions.
